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A Message From The Principal

Hello ICRS Friends and Families,

Immaculate Conception Regional School continues 70-years of Catholic education in the Skagit Valley. The school still demonstrates excellent academics, a commitment to service and a strong Catholic identity steeped in rich traditions.

When I moved from San Francisco to the Skagit Valley in 2002, I left a very big family of seven siblings and 22 nieces and nephews, plus extended family. In my 18 years in the Skagit Valley, Immaculate Conception Regional School has become my local family. In fact, I tell the students they are all like grandchildren to me, all 192 of them. Everyday we are creating lasting relationships and fond memories through our traditions. Here are



some of my favorite ICRS traditions. Perhaps, some of our alumni will think, "They are still doing that?"

- In 2014 we began the tradition of saints in attendance at the All Saints Day School Mass. Second graders
 process down the aisle dressed as their favorite saints. Their colorful costumes and sweet faces add to the
 joyous celebration of the Eucharist and speak to our Catholic identity.
- The Science (8th), Cultural Fair (7th), and Engineering (6th) Fair takes place in March where students show
 case their family histories and others show case their ingenuity and curiosity with science and engineering
 projects. This event attracts a packed house and gives me an opportunity to learn more about the students
 and be amazed by their creativity.
- During Catholic Schools Week, Thursday is dedicated to grandparents and seniors in our community. The
 children prepare a Mass celebrating grandparents and bestow a special blessing on them. The Booster
 Group then hosts a luncheon at St. Joseph Center complete with student entertainment, door prizes, and
 good desserts. This event brings the larger community together at ICRS and is filled with good cheer.
- My all-time favorite prayer service is the Stations of the Cross re-enacted by the 8th graders. Students solemnly follow the cross around the block to St. Joseph Center. There, the 8th graders lead the community through a prayerful re-enactment of Jesus' journey to Calvary. This is a powerful way to tell the story of Christ's love for us.
- At the end of the year, we host one of our wettest days, Field Day. Students, staff, parents and even grandparents
 join in fun and festivities. We begin with a hamburger lunch for all, then students gather in Family Groups led
 by 7th graders and participate in outdoor fun, such as sack races, tug-o-war, balloon tosses, dunk tank, etc.
 Toward the end of the day, the 8th graders compete in a friendly volleyball match against the staff. On rare
 occasions the students win! This is a fun day for all.

At Immaculate Conception Regional School, we educate and mold children academically and socially from pre-school through eighth grade while building the foundation for further education and career development. We were thrilled to witness firsthand some of these special bonds this past summer when the class of 1969 celebrated their 50th reunion from "Immaculate Conception" as it was known in those days (it did not become a regional school until the 1990's). The attendees of the 1969 class reunion took a tour of the school and were able to see all that had changed in the past 50 years – and all that had not!





They traded many humorous stories and remembered interesting tidbits about the beloved staff. They thought of Sister Angela, also known as Sister Olivia; she was given the name of Saint Angela when she originally took vows but was able to use her given name after Vatican II. Father O'Brien was also remembered; they reminisced about the times they would send in the "sacrificial lamb" to figure out which confessional Father O'Brien was hearing, as apparently his penances were much more severe than the other priests.

This special reunion was put into motion by classmates Mike Spink, Mary Jane Brannan, and Colleen (Hulbert) Fisher. This was the third "official" reunion this class has organized; they had a reunion back in 1989 and then again in 1999. Though many of their former classmates have

since moved out of the Skagit Valley, many of them remain good friends throughout the years.

The class of 1969 graduated with 35 students. Of these students, 19 attended Mount Vernon High School; 6 ranked in the top 10 academically at MVHS and 2 would become Mount Vernon High School Valedictorian and Salutatorian.

Though the years have come and gone, the friendships made in the class of 1969 have endured!

An important practice at Immaculate Conception Regional School is the concept of Service Learning. At ICRS, "staff and parents are committed to preparing our students to live as citizens in service and leadership to their community." Each middle school student is required to complete five hours of community service

each trimester. By introducing service at a young age, we hope that ICRS students will make service part of their regular routine.

This summer we were pleased to see the ICRS service commitment in action. A new member of the alumni community, Jade Boyd (class of 2019), and her father, Jim Boyd, made the commitment to service by giving back to ICRS. more," she added.





The map has been a popular recess option dating back to the days of Mrs. Webb, who would use the playground map to teach her students United States geography in conjunction with President Day each year. She taught from the 1950's to the late 1980's. Now, with the work of the Boyd family, the playground map will continue to be part of the ICRS curriculum for years to come.

When asked if Jade could give any advice to our current students about serving and volunteering she said, "Find an area that needs help. No project is too big or too small, just jump in and help out! Endowment

Since its inception in the mid 1980s, the Immaculate Conception Regional School's endowment has had an impact on every student and family that has wandered the halls of our school. The ICRS endowment provides financial security for the school, keeps tuition affordable, aids program improvements and teacher compensation, and provides student tuition assistance. This year, thanks to a generous gift from an ICRS supporter, the ICRS endowment will add another fund to help in supporting our school.

The school endowment was created in 1986 by then ICS principal Sister Angela McCarthy, who has been described by former board members as being a great business woman and visionary. She had the foresight to see not only the need for a school endowment, but the opportunity to create parishioner support for ICRS by creating such a fund.

The endowment began with a total of \$6,420 that Sister McCarthy had pulled together from what she called her "extras" or "stash." She had been saving money from parishioners who would slip her a check now and then for ICS. After 34 years, this "stash" has grown to just over \$2.8 million. Much of this growth was due in part to two very large land contributions. The first in 1990, the old Burnnett Building in downtown Mount Vernon, and the second in 1994, which consisted of 34 acres of farmland in the Skagit Valley.

In 1988 Sister McCarthy pulled together the first Endowment Advisory Council. Those first members were Ken Christianson, Earl Angevine (deceased), Mike Spink, Mike Meeuwsen, Dave Lang, and Sister McCarthy herself. Today the ICRS endowment is managed by the ICRS Endowment Board, which is made up of volunteers of past and present ICRS parents. While this volunteer group has seen members come and go over the past 30 years, the one constant has been the group's steadfast stewardship to continue to help ICRS and its families.

Through strategic investments of the money and then providing the school with the interest from these funds, the ICRS endowment is able to provide financial support for the school and tuition assistance for students.

With the addition of the generous legacy gift provided by Marie A. Kunferman, today the account is comprised of 9 primary funds as follows:

- · Jack Brandmeir Scholarship
- Main Endowment Fund
- · Marie A. Kunferman Tuition Assistance Endowment
- Sports Fund
- The Scholarship Fund
- · Transportation Capital Fund
