

PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE


Dear Parents:


All 2nd-8th grade ICRS students participate in MAP testing each fall and spring. This is a standardized test that measures student



growth in the areas of math, language arts, and reading, as well as science starting in 6th grade. Teachers use the data gathered from this testing to inform their teaching. I'd like to share the school-wide MAP results from testing this fall, which attest to the positive impact Catholic education makes on students, helping them develop critical thinking skills and a strong academic foundation.

One thing that I have noticed over the years is how well ICRS does with growth. Our students start a little above the national average, but by the end of 8th grade, they are significantly above average. Not only that, but a majority of our students also move from the 61-80% percentile to the over 80% percentile, meaning that even children in the middle are challenged and grow in achievement at a rate much faster than their peers in other schools. I am very proud of how ICRS challenges and supports each student. Please see the attached graphs showing our 8th grade achievement in math and reading from this falls' MAP test.





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

I am also comparing 6th grade science to 8th grade science.



Our focus is on growth – and we are achieving impressive growth. Some people may say that I am comparing two separate groups of students, which is true, but this is a pattern that happens year after year at ICRS.

MAP test results for most classes will be sent home today in the Brown Envelope. Some teachers have already conferenced with students and sent the reports home. Teachers have already met to analyze these scores. If your child scored below the 20th percentile in any subject, teachers are making specific plans regarding how to support your child. We are also looking at students who scored above the 95th percentile and creating ways to challenge those students to keep growing. Ten 8th graders scored above the 95th percentile in at least one subject, and NO 8th graders scored below the 18th percentile in any subject. Way to go, 8th grade!

MENTAL HEALTH RESOURCE NIGHT

ICRS is hosting two mental health resource sessions for ICRS parents in October. The first session will be held Tuesday, October 18th for the parents of elementary aged children in grades PreK through 4th grade and the second session will be held Thursday, October 20th for the parents of middle school aged children in 5th through 8th grade. The sessions will be led by ICRS parent Kristel Hollick, who is a school counselor in the Snohomish County School District. She has extensive experience working with students who experience anxiety, trauma and behavioral issues and helps them learn skills to cope with their feelings. She will be giving us practical information about mental health of children. We hope you will join us for these important informational sessions. Childcare will be offered during the elementary session. One volunteer hour will be offered per family for attending each class.
